New Models of School-College Cooperation: The Maryland K-16 Partnership

Thirty years ago public school teachers and staff members rarely interacted with their counterparts at colleges and universities, and when they did, a perceived hierarchical relationship often prevented any real engagement on problems of mutual interest. More recently, the growth of the K-16 movement in America has brought together members of these constituencies on an equal footing to work together to ensure that education from preschool through lifelong teaming can become a seamless continuum. This discussion will explore the growth and development of the K-16 movement with special emphasis on cooperative relationships in the natural sciences and mathematics.

About the Speaker.....

Michael R. Rosenthal received a BA degree from Western Reserve University (now Case Western Reserve University) in chemistry magna cum laude, and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He received an MS and a Ph.D. in Inorganic Chemistry from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign under Russell S. Drago in 1965.

Dr. Rosenthal spent 19 years as a faculty member, administrator, and community leader at Bard College in New York, followed by service as the chief academic officer at St. Mary's College of Maryland and Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas. Dr. Rosenthal assumed his present position as Deputy Secretary of Higher Education in Maryland in January 1996.

Dr. Rosenthal brings to this position thirty-five years of experience in teaching, research, campus and community service, and government. He identifies himself as a liberal arts and sciences-educated generalist, who employs the methods learned as a scientist in solving educational policy problems.

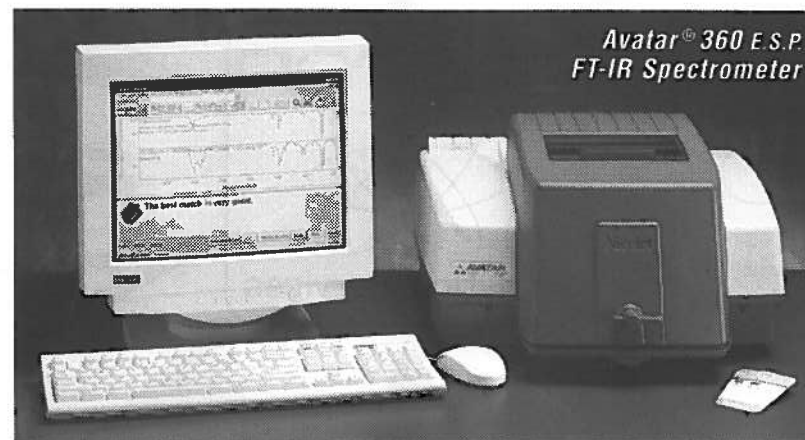

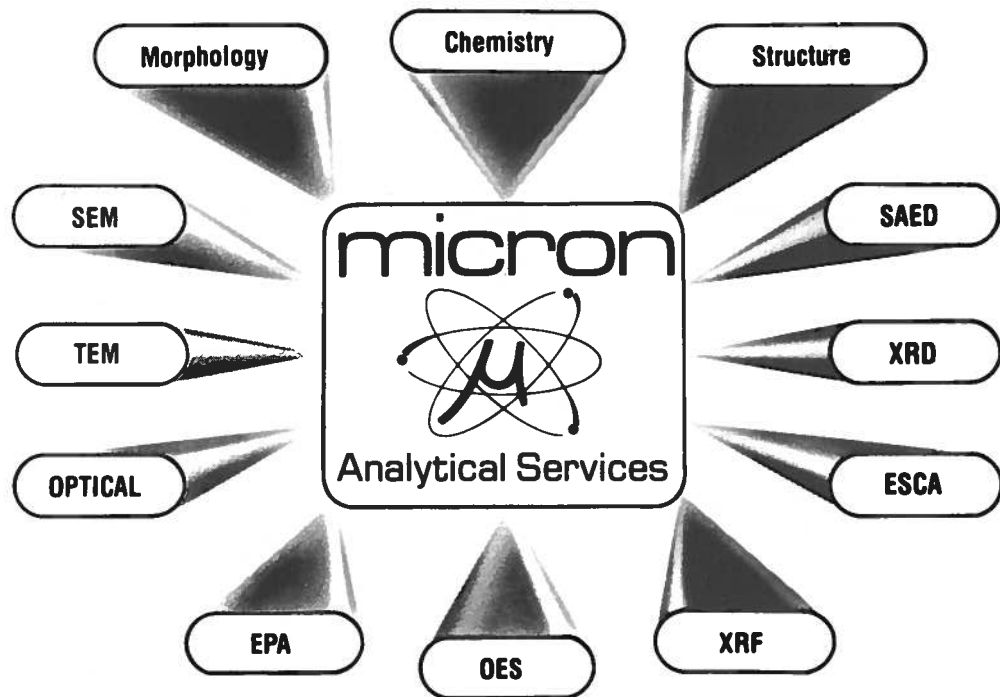

NT WORKSHOP - A group of faculty affiliated with the New Traditions Project will offer a curricular reform workshop at Towson University on March 12-13, 1999. The Project is one of five systemic curricular reform projects supported by NSF in chemistry. You may have heard of their work or visited their web site (<http://newtraditions.chem.wisc.edu/>).

The project is now sharing innovations with colleagues in institutions outside its consortium. This sixth in a series of workshops aims to disseminate what has been learned about enhancing chemistry instruction. Faculty teams from two- and four-year colleges and universities throughout the area are invited to participate to experience ways to create an active learning environment in lecture courses, convert traditional laboratory exercises to guided inquiry experiments, and observe different ways to use technology as a learning/teaching tool.
