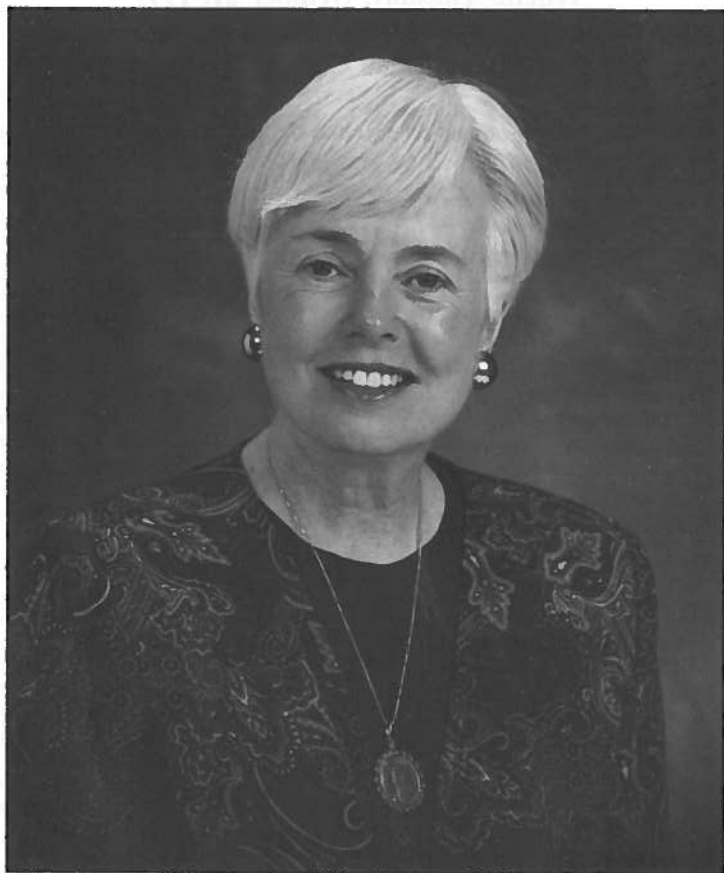

RITA BOGGS

Rita Boggs is president of American Research and Testing, Inc., the company she founded fifteen years ago. She received a B.A. in chemistry from Notre Dame College of Staten Island and an M.S. in chemistry from Union College prior to receiving a Ph.D. in physical chemistry from the University of Pennsylvania in 1973. She next spent three years in postdoctoral research at Cornell University.

Prior to assuming her present position Dr. Boggs spent four years as a senior research chemist at the Colgate-Palmolive Research Center and three years as an assistant vice president in the California Division of the United States Testing Company.

In addition to her industrial activities, she is currently teaching at California State University at Dominguez Hills. She has previously taught at El Camino College, Rutgers University and Notre Dame College of Staten Island.

Dr. Boggs is active in the Southern California Section of the ACS, being a councilor and member of the executive committee and having been program chair and chair of the section. She has received that section's Agnes Ann Green Distinguished Award.

CAREERS IN SMALL CHEMICAL BUSINESS

The talk, which has been presented at many locations in southern California, is intended primarily for students, both undergraduate and graduate, who are struggling to make career decisions in science. The pros and cons of working in large companies versus small businesses will be discussed. Projects undertaken by American Research and Testing will be reviewed and the fun in doing chemistry will be communicated.

HOWARD COUNTY TEACHER OF THE YEAR

Kathleen Thompson, currently our Education Committee's liaison with high school teachers and also candidate for chair-elect of the Maryland Section, was named Howard County Teacher of the Year in a ceremony held last May at Atholton High School.

Thompson had formerly been a teacher at Centennial High School, also in Howard County, for eight years, including service as science department chairperson. She then worked as a science specialist with the Maryland Department of Education and three years ago returned to the classroom, this time at Atholton.

In recent years she has served on the Board of The Chemistry Alliance of Maryland and has been instrumental in establishing a high school chemistry teachers support group known as Chemistry Educators of Maryland (ChEMd).

CHEMISTRY OLYMPICS TRAINING CAMP

Two high school students from Maryland were selected to attend the Chemistry Olympics Training Camp for two weeks last June. The camp is sponsored by the American Chemical Society. Seven students participated in a series of exams sponsored by the Maryland Section and held at the College of Notre Dame in April. Nationally, approximately 1000 students took the tests and twenty were selected for the training camp. This is the first time that students from Maryland were selected.

The successful students were Joseph Comberiatì, a junior at Mount Saint Joseph High School in Baltimore (teacher Mr. Bernard Kenyon) and Alexander Ioannidis, a sophomore at Bel Air High School in Harford County (teacher Ms. Mary Fox). These students, with their parents and teachers, were recognized at the Section's Remsen Award meeting held in June at The Johns Hopkins University.

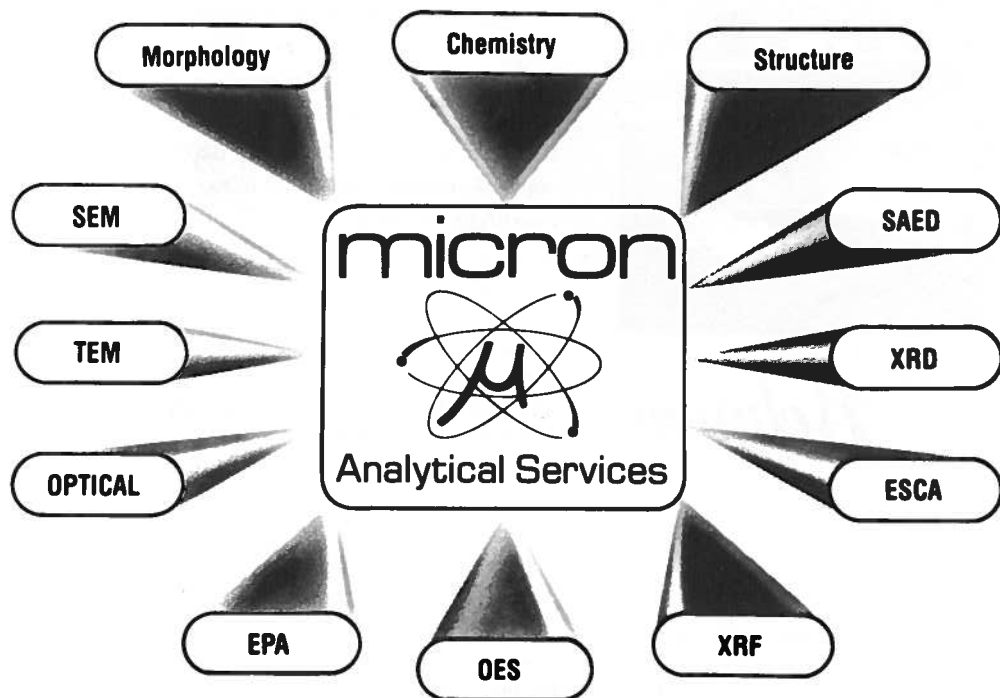

Kids and Chemistry activities in Baltimore City and in Baltimore, Harford, Anne Arundel, Howard and Montgomery Counties were well support by volunteers, including Dr. Victoria Kuntz, Dr. Anna Kraut, Dr. Mark Greenberg, Dr. Shirish Shah, Dr. Mark Gold, Dr. Angela Sherman, Dr. Alfred Amah and Dr. Ernest Silversmith.

The very popular experiments and demonstrations included Slime, milk, invisible ink, chromatography and acid-base.
